# 1. Strategic Overview

Public Works is a department within our community responsible for ALL Public Assets and Infrastructure including the operation and maintenance of them. Our community assets are aging, many were poorly constructed and in disrepair due to the same as well as lack of appropriate care and maintenance. Current Infrastructure issues are preventing us from adding new housing to the systems (water, sewer, power).

The mission of the department is to develop a strong competent team and implement appropriate maintenance plans to manage the Nations assets safely and effectively. Public Works is also a great stepping stone for our youth as we provide introductory a multitude of job placements throughout the community, helping students identify what jobs they enjoy, may be suited for and encourage specific education / training in respective fields.

### 2. (Financial Overview -N/A) Highlights for 2022

- Created 14 additional jobs within Public Works for our residents currently employ 20 people
- Equipment training completed for core Public Works staff
  - Tele-Handler / Excavator / Skid Steer / Hiab (Truck mounted crane)
- Core Public Works staff enrolled in WaterSafeBC Training through Thompson Rivers University
- Upcoming safety training scheduled for all workers
  - WHMIS, Hazard ID, Confined Space, Working at Heights

### 3. Functional Overview

The Public Works Team embraces the traditional belief of TSA-WAAK-NISH We Are All One.

We have many responsibilities and must interact with the entire community to maintain the Nations assets which include:

- Building and Facility Operations & Maintenance
- · Vehicles, Equipment and Boats
- Water and Sanitation Systems
- Power
- Docks
- · Roads and Drainage
- Garbage and Recycling
- Telephones
- Internet and TV

Increased staffing and developing a strong competent team through training is closing the gap on the proper care and maintenance of our assets. This is also preparing the department to effectively manage the repairs and upgrades to our infrastructure and community homes.

Part of community upgrades is the Houpsitas Village Infrastructure Renewal (HVIR) – a Capital Project. Capital Projects are defined as New Construction, Expansion, Renovation, or Replacement. The Nation is Overhauling and/or Replacing ALL of our Infrastructure: Power, Water and Sewer. We began by making the community safe through water system repairs until the system is replaced. Island Health now holds our water operating permit. Regular monthly sampling being done per Island Health requirements. Our Powerline was also in dangerous need of repair. We have replaced many poles and upgraded almost all the transformers in the community.
